Chairs for the event were Lions Darrell Costain & Gelaine Orvik from the Gateway Lions Club and Lion Allen Dockter from Capital City Lions Club. These games are the main fund raising activity for both of the Lions Clubs. With the funds made from this activity, both Lions clubs are then able to do their service projects and make donations to organizations and individuals. The main source of making money is to sell ads to businesses, individuals and Lions Clubs. These ads are placed in the game program.



The program is then sold at the games. The games pit the best senior players from Class "A" against the best senior players from Class "B". There are games for both boys and girls. The High School coaches from both

Hazelton Lions Club 60th Anniversary

The Hazelton Lions Club celebrated its 60th anniversary during its May 23rd meeting which was held at the Hazelton Coffee Shop. Main St. Market supplied an ice cream cake to thank the Lions for replacing a much needed compressor and cooler. Arlene Davis supplied the meal as thanks for receiving funding to repair the furnace.

Special guests were Past International Director Bill Gackle of Kulm and Crystal Dueker from Fargo Gateway Lions Club. Dueker is Service Chair for District 5 NE and Zone 8 Chairman.

The Hazelton Lions Club was organized in March 1962 with 36 members and officially recognized by Lions Clubs International on May 15, 1962. They were sponsored by the Bismarck Lions Club. Hazelton School Superintendent Bert Olson was the club's first president. Later, the Hazelton Club sponsored the Braddock and Zeeland Lions Clubs.

Hazelton's first service project was to clean the windows of the new elementary school – built in 1963.

They raised funds for uniforms for the Hazelton High School Band using a unique method. Lions member Harold Gimbel owned and operated Gimbel's Bar. The bar ceiling had a wood beam ceiling sectioned into squares. Money was hidden behind some of the squares and chances were sold on each square. It did not take long to sell all the squares and

enough money was netted to buy new uniforms for the entire band.

Another of the many projects sponsored by the Hazelton Lions Club was a fundraiser that provided funds to send a young local girl to St. Louis, Missouri, for special eye surgery. Lions members organized into teams and attended neighboring Lions Club meetings to sell raffle tickets on a snowmobile. Their fund drive to help pay for the eye surgery was successful as was the surgery itself.

After a few years of alternating their meeting place between the Rosendahl and Davis cafes, the members realized they needed more space because of the size of the membership. They made an agreement with the Hazelton American Legion Club to restore the old Legion Hall, complete with air conditioning, and rename it the Hazelton Community Center.

Several past members have served in various positions on the district level including Zone Chairman, Deputy District Governor and District Governor (in 1969 and, again, in 1970). Hadley Seeklander also served as an International Representative and a staff representative for Lions Clubs International for 15 years and organized more than 300 Lions Clubs throughout the Districts.

It was decided to change the club's meeting date to the first Thursday of each month, beginning with a so-

cial at 6:30 pm, followed by the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

Dueker stated that the Lions service to the community should be celebrated. "When the chips are down, you can count on a Lion. Where there's a need – there's a

Lion."

Plaques and awards listed on walls inside the Community Center tell the story. The Hazelton Lions Club lives up to the Lions motto "We Serve".
