



Blood, sweat, and tears! A Big Nome Project

On Tuesday, June 15, 2021, the Enderlin Lions Club went down the road a bit and met at the ongoing renovation of the Nome Schoolhouse.

Eighteen Lions, 15 spouses, and 15 Club guests sat down in the restored gym, (“Home of the Wildcats”) for a meatball and potato supper. Lions First Vice President Bobby Geske welcomed all and Lion (also Reverend) Grant Patterson offered a meal prayer.

Following supper, the Lions and guests were split into two groups by the Schoolhouse’s owners, Chris Armbrust and Teresa Perleberg, and two tours were given simultaneously. What followed was a lesson in planning and hard work. The existing main building was built in 1916, the gym was attached in 1949 and a tasteful and contributing under-construction two-story addition is

part of it as well. All total, 27,000 square feet of building has either been built or renovated.

The business plan is a one-of-a-kind Dakota prairie hospitality center for meals, lodging, retail, educational seminars and events. The first mission of the Schoolhouse is to showcase the owner’s passion for natural fibers and weaving, or in their words, the fiber arts. The owners currently have a farm east of Kindred, ND and

raise llamas, alpacas and sheep for shearing.

The Nome Schoolhouse will be the home of Shepherd Industries, LLC. Dakota Fiber Mill, and Bear Creek Felting.

The Nome Schoolhouse project is of massive scale. Yet, management is careful to honor the provenance of old Nome with local artifacts and curios proudly displayed. Even the old Nome Main Street movie theatre’s flooring has been repurposed in the main room of

the new addition. Old classrooms are also remembered. In-house lodging has been well-planned with 11 hotel rooms on the top floor of the old building. These rooms range from a honeymoon suite to ones of more modest size. A new elevator will safely provide access. Another plus is a new kitchen providing a dining experience in the main lounge.

Like every construction project, the devil is in the details. the main

rehab and construction are behind them; the details await. Rental rooms are booked for a week away and the first wedding is scheduled for August 18.

The Nome School’s website is Nomeschoolhouse.com and a quick review will convince all of the project’s uniqueness. There is nothing like it in the upper Midwest (or maybe in the world?).

A “must stop” for any returning relative or visiting friend.

We had a very receptive community and so meetings were planned and after two informational meetings were held. We had an application

Notice of a dues increase proposal

This notice is to the Lions of 5NW for actions to be discussed and voted upon at the upcoming 5NW meeting at the State Convention in Watford City on Saturday, October 23, 2021.

The 5NW District Executive Team has recommended, and the 5NW District Cabinet has approved, to present a dues increase to the 5NW Lions membership. Currently, our annual dues for the district are \$7.00 per member, per year. These dues are assessed twice a year in the amount of \$3.50. The dues are assessed in July and again in Jan. The proposal to be voted upon, is to increase that assessment to \$5.00 twice a year for a total of \$10.00 per year. The proposal is to put that increase into effect starting on Jan 1, 2022.

Please note that 5NW has not had a dues increase in many years. With costs increasing with everything we do, we believe this is a prudent time to ask the membership for this increase.

In June, I attended the dedication of Sunset Park and ribbon cutting event hosted by LaMoure Lions. Food and entertainment were thoroughly enjoyed by all. The next day I had the pleasure of attending Gateway Lion's club 60th Anniversary and Awards Event. Congratulations, Gateway!

In July, I was invited to attend the 45th Annual Lions All Star Basketball Games event held in West Fargo, ND. It was organized by the Gateway and Bismarck Lions Clubs. It was a very well-run event with over 1,500 attendees. Kudos go to Gateway's president Gelaine Orvik, 1st VDG Scott Hildre, and all their members for a great event. PDG Grant Kahlbaugh and I helped with the awards presentation that followed the completion of the boys' and girls' games.

This fall, please check with

your local schools for those interested in participating in the 'peace poster contest'. The theme this year is 'we are all connected'. Club secretaries should order the number of peace poster kits they need. Your club will be billed if the district needs to purchase them for you. Club secretaries should also order 'New Member Induction Kits'. They are free. Go to your SHOP icon on the LCI website and use the search tool to find them. I also have several if needed.

If you have not registered for the Lion's State Convention in Watford City October 22 & 23rd, please do this soon. The registration is presently \$115. At the door it is \$130. The committee needs this information to plan for events and meals. They have great fun planned for us. Their theme is "Rockin Steady with Teddy".

Each month I will highlight one of our 5NE goals that was briefly mentioned in the July issue of the ND Lion. This month it's the 're-establish-

ment of a ladder of leadership in our district'. We seemed to have fallen behind in preparing and training dedicated Lions to be our future leaders. I stepped-up to be 2nd VDGE in 2018 not because I was asked, but because no one else did. With nearly 1,200 Lions in our district, I wondered why a succession of leadership plan was not firmly in place. Below are five steps that, if implemented, may help to close this gap.

(1) New members should undergo an orientation program within the first six weeks of induction. This would provide them with information about the history of their club, their district, and LCI.

(2) New members should be assigned an experienced member of the club to be their mentor. This could be their sponsor or another member of the club.

(3) After a member has worked on at least one service project in the community and has been an officer in the club, they should be encouraged to attend an Emerging Lion Leadership Institute (ELLI). Remember, you are ineligible for ELLI once you have served as club president. Current club

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presidents, and past presidents, should be encouraged to attend an ALLI (Advanced) and/or a RLLI (Regional) Lion Learning Institute.

(4) The progression for a Lion to become 2nd VDG is as follows: member --- officer --- president --- zone chair.

(5) It is the responsibility of every club to identify dedicated members that have potential to be a future leader. Names need to be passed on to your zone chair and DG team. The process of preparing them needs to start as soon as possible. This would allow the DG team and members of their club to encourage them along the way. "Lions do Magical things"

Fargo Lions Club to celebrate 100th Anniversary

The Fargo Lions Club will celebrate the 100th anniversary of its charter on Wednesday, September 15, 2021. A ribbon cutting ceremony will take place at 4:00 p.m. at the Spirit of the Sandbaggers Memorial, to be followed by a celebration meal in the early evening. All Lions are invited to celebrate the anniversary of North Dakota's first Lions Club founded in 1921.

The Fargo Lions Club was organized on May 7, 1921, by District Governor Frank C. Berry of Minneapolis. Its first officers included Ed T. Conmy, President; Fred M. Hector, Secretary and Treasurer. There were 42 charter members, two from each occupation (dentists, bankers, druggists, life insurance, undertaker, oculists, IRS collectors, surgeons, hotel managers, and capitalists – apparently trust companies weren't thought of very highly and the two members from Northern Trust took the label "capitalists" on the original charter).

The club has always met on Mondays at noon. First in the Commercial Club Room of the Old Chamber of Commerce Building at 502 1st Avenue North. Meals were 25-40 cents; then the club moved to the Blue Room at the Powers Hotel (100 members) and meals were 80 cents. In 1957, the club moved to the Town Hall of the Gardner Hotel (146 members). Since then, the club met at the Elks Building (where the new Courthouse is located) and now at the Radisson (over a two decades). Early membership records were lost in a flood, but all available records are now preserved at the North Dakota Institute for Regional Studies located at North Dakota State University.

The Fargo Lions Club has

sponsored several clubs, including Finley, Valley City, Hawley (MN), Casselton, Moorhead (MN), Mapleton, and Fargo Roamer 4 Wheel Drive. Several Leo Clubs have also benefitted from Fargo Lions Club sponsorship including the Oak Grove Leo Club and the Griffon Leo Club at Fargo Davies High School.

Twenty-four Fargo Lions have served as District Governors with their partners in service: E. T. Conmy, 1922-23; R. T. Trubey, 1929-30; Jake Mauer, 1948-49 (who was also MD5 Secretary Treasurer from 1951-1964); P. J. Carey, 1953-54; Mel Toussaint, 1955-56; Fred Hultz, 1957-58; Dr. Frederick Walsh, 1961-62 (Marian); Vernon Sjoquist, 1963-64 (Ruby); V. E. Kroeber, 1967-68 (Kay); W. J. Seifert, 1971-72 (Addy); Leo Eldred, 1972-73 (Alice); Lyle Swor, 1976-77 (Elaine); J. Leo Malony, 1979-80 (Blanche); Mayo Christianson, 1983-84 (Winifred); Ted Appel, 1986-87 (Marian) and MD5 Council Chair 1987-1988; Ed Morken, 1994-95 (Marian); Dave Butler, 1995-96 (Crystal); Katherine Tweed, 2006-07 and 2013-14 (Doug); John Dobbs, 2007-08 (Anita); Dr. Robert Littlefield, 2010-11 (Kathy) and MD5 Council Chair 2011-12 ; Mel Olson, 2012-13 (Kim); and Rob Lein, 2018-19 (Carla).

Six Fargo Lions have been inducted into the North Dakota Lions Hall of Fame: Edward Conmy, 1982; Jake Mauer, 1982; Bill Seifert, 1985; Lyle Swor, 1991; Robert Littlefield, 2017; Mel Olson, 2019.

In the early history of Lions Clubs International, two Fargo Lions were listed as "international counselors": Ed Conmy and R. T. Trubey. Dr. Robert Littlefield was

elected as an International Director in Toronto, Canada and served from 2014-2016. In addition, he was appointed as a Trustee for Lions Club International Foundation representing the United States from 2016-2019.

Fargo hosted Melvin Jones as a guest in 1936-1937 and welcomed an International President—Frank V. Birch—in 1937. Fargo Lions attended its first district convention in 1922 and hosted its first district convention in 1926. Since then, the Fargo Club has hosted many district and multiple district conventions. The earliest recorded attendance of Fargo Lions at a national or international convention was 1930-31 in Boston, MA.

The Fargo Lions Club has received recognition as a model club in the SightFirst II Campaign (2005) and Campaign 100 (2021) sponsored by Lions Clubs International Foundation.

Early activities included projects for young people: For nearly 40 years (1920s-1940s), the club hosted a Christmas Party for the ND Children's Home; from the mid-1930s to the 1940s, served an annual turkey dinner for the St. John's Orphanage (108 pounds of turkey served); provided sponsorship of a Boy Scout Troup as early as 1929; offered a Student Loan Fund (\$3,000 on hand for NDSU students); supported 4H activities as early as 1929; provided milk to area children; and sponsored candidates to Boys and Girls State. Club members have supported the Salvation Army since 1928 (projects and bellringing). The club started purchasing glasses in 1931; and in the 1960s, "new eyes for the needy" was the slogan as hundreds of pairs

of glasses were collected and checked. Records show that the club contributed to support causes in line with the times: Community Chest, unemployment relief, flood relief, defense bonds, Red Cross, books for service men, clothes for refugees. The club sold "nuts, bulbs, and brooms" for years and sponsored Journey for Sight, cake auctions, and a "Monday Night Football" raffle. The Fargo Lions Club built a cottage at the Y Camp and maintained a supportive relationship and helped with various cleaning and maintenance projects over the years. Under the leadership of Lion Mike Benson, the Fargo Conservancy Park began and has become an on-going signature service for decades to the environment and our community. Most recently, the effort to dedicate a tribute to the spirit of the sandbaggers who saved the Fargo community and surrounding region is being dedicated in conjunction with the celebration.

Through it all, the club has changed to meet the changing times. From its start in 1921, the Fargo Lions Club has created a self-portrait of leadership and service to the community and world. The club can be proud that the work of its founders and those who served over the past 100 years as Helen Keller's "Knights of the Blind."
